CRITERION I – CURRICULAR ASPECTS

1.1 – Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 – Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

Sri Venkateswara arts college popularly known as S.V. Arts College, was established by Tirumala Tirupati Devasthanams as a first grade degree college

in tirupati. It was initially affiliated to Madras University and offered Intermediate and B.A Courses. Then in 1954 it was affiliated to Sri Venkateswara University (S.V.U) Tirupati. At present the college offers 24 Programs in B.A, B.Com and B.Sc. In view of changing trends need based courses involving subjects like Computer Science, Electronics, Dairy Science, Microbiology and Bio-technology are introduced. The college has attached hostel about 70% of student strength resides in college hostels. All the academic activities are carried out in line with the rules, regulations and guide lines of affiliating university. Overall administration is carried out under the control of TTD management. The financial needs of the college are served by TTD management. Principal is the head of institution who is responsible for all academic and administrative actions. The principal consults staff council (Council Comprising of Heads of departments) while making important decisions. Various Committees were formed, involving each and every faculty member to design and conduct curricular, Co- Curricular and extension activities. At the beginning of the academic year, principal conducts meetings with various committees to discuss and plan the academic and developmental activities to be carried out in the present academic year. Time table committee prepares over all college time table which is circulated to all departments. Heads of the departments in turn prepare their departmental time tables and distribute workload among their faculty members. Faculty members of each department prepare annual curricular plans and teaching plans for their allotted courses. To deliver the curriculum effectively the faculty adopt various ICT enabled teaching methods in addition to regular class room teaching methods. Virtual and digital labs are used as per curriculum continuous internal evaluation is done through assignments, class room discussions and internal exams. Students lagging behind are identified and helped through Remedial coaching. Science departments have well equipped laboratories. The practicals (or) experiments are designed in such a way to ensure efficient curriculum delivery. Through CIE, the class in charge lecturers monitor student performance and slow learners are identified. Slow learners are provided with Remedial Coaching by taking additional classes.

Sri Venkateswara Arts College was established by TTD in 1945. In the year 1970, it was planned to celebrate "Silver Jubilee" after the completion of 25 years of its establishment.
